


CYPSC Timeline

Approach

- CYPSCs are universal for all children & young people
- Progressive universalism

"all children would be supported, but those with particular needs would be supported more than others." (NESC, 2005)

Proportionate universalism

"Focusing solely on the most disadvantaged will not reduce health inequalities sufficiently. To reduce the steepness of the social gradient in health, actions must be universal, but with a scale and intensity that is proportionate to the level of disadvantage. This is called proportionate universalism." (The Marmot Review, 2010)





Evidence Informed Approach

- Evidence informed practices and services based on the integration of experience, judgement and expertise with the best available external evidence from systematic research
- "Effective interagency working acts to create the 'permitting circumstances' for better functioning of front-line services and front-line staff." (Statham, 2011)
- Data & Monitoring
- Using emerging evidence in a structured way
- Consultation with children and young people
- Learning from other structures nationally and in other jurisdictions



Some national commitments


- G2. Ensure planning and co-ordination of parenting supports at local level through CYPSC.

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


Working Together
