

Conclusions from Effectiveness Studies (Barry et al., 2009)

- Mental Health promotion in schools, when implemented effectively, can produce long-term benefits for young people, including emotional and social functioning and improved academic performance
- Knowledge only programmes have minimal effects on behaviour
- Programmes adopting a whole school approach are more successful and the most promising

Why would a school become involved in Jigsaw

- Constructive and effective in dealing with Mental Health
- Better engagement and dialogue with mental health services in HSE and with NEPS
- That students would have a better connection with their school
- Create an atmosphere in our schools that would produce better Learning & Behavioural outcomes



What's different about this project?

- **➤ The interaction between the Schools, NEPS and HSE**
- > The evolution of counselling services to schools
- **➤ The development of the Care Team concept in school**
- **➤** Access to and use of Data (My World Survey)
- ➤ The use of the student voice stress; binge drinking; bullying; peermentoring
- ➤ Raising the levels of connectedness and positivity towards school through the existing pastoral system.

 ".. A key finding of the MWS concerns the role of "One Good Adult" in a young person's life. Young people who do not feel connected or bonded to those around them, were more vulnerable in experiencing mental health difficulties. The MWS findings suggest that every young person needs at least one supportive adult in their lives"
